This will be an introduction to the Indian cinema, dubbed "Bollywood," produced in Mumbai (Bombay), India in the Hindi language. Its focus will be on the history of Indian cinema, as well as Indian religions, cultures, and aesthetics as reflected in popular Hindi cinema from Independence (1947) to the present day, with some attention to transnational contexts. Special attention will be given to the pervasive role of music, dance, and song. There will also be some discussion on the influence of Indian culture and Bollywood in English and Hollywood films. Film clips will be shown with English subtitles; no previous

## **America and Vietnam**

Major themes will include the history of Vietnam, America's involvement in the crisis, and general aspects such as race, combat, international diplomacy and popular culture. The class will discuss how society, popular culture and race contributed to the issues and political decisions of the era. The final section will conclude with the legacy of Vietnam in the subconscious of the country. Suggested Reading: Where the Domino Fell: America and Vietnam 1945-1995, James S. Olson and Randy Roberts. Maximum class size: 80.

# The Fifty Year Legacy of Civil Rights in the U.S.A.: 1963-2013

The unprecedented change and turmoil that occurred in 1963 will be examined including the shift in policies toward minorities, women, and immigrants that resulted in The Equal Pay (for women) Act of 1963, The Civil Rights Act of 1964, The Voting Rights Act of 1965, and The Immigration and Nationality Act of 1965. Further, the current status of each Act will be assessed. The last two sessions we will visit the Black Archives on FAMU's campus and the John G. Riley House Museum. Suggested Reading: The 13th, 14th, and 15th Amendments to

the U.S. Constitution. Presidential remarks upon signing the respective Acts. View the PBS series on Reconstruction in the South. View the DVD entitled "In America" about an immigrant family. Maximum class size: 110.

## Florence and its Piazzas

This course covers the origins and evolution of Florence as a city. Why the town is located where it is, why it is organized in a particular way and the major geographical, historical, political, cultural and military shaping forces that made it the town we see today. Emphasis is on the major public squares or piazzas of Florence including their history, spaces, architecture, uses and roles of these vibrant places in

the life of the city. Comments will address both historical factors and current design lessons that these places offer us. The course is illustrated with slides. **Suggested Reading:** Reading material will be mentioned on a lecture by lecture basis.

## **Snippets of History from the Forgotten Coast**

This course will examine lore and artifacts of what is known as the Forgotten Coast. If you like oysters, mullet or stone crabs, the fall semester is perfect for snippets of information about the people who bring you those delicacies. Glean bits and pieces from forgotten train rides on rickety tracks from Port of St. Marks to Tallahassee; or rare accounts of the life on a frontier full of alligators, snakes and sink holes. The course consists of lectures, discussions and the occasional field trip. **Suggested Reading:** Leo Lovell, *Spring Creek Chronicles*; William W. Rogers, *Outposts on the Gulf. Maximum class size:* 80.

## Hard-boiled Crime Fiction & Film Noir in the U.S.: The Beginnings

Ernest Rehder, FSU Professor Emeritus of English 11:30 a.m. - 1:30 p.m., Mondays (Room 214, Pepper Center, FSU Campus)

Crime as a subject in fiction and art is of ancient origin and has appealed to both the popular and the cultivated imagination. The crime fiction of the 1930s and 40s and the Hollywood films inspired by it are eminently popular or "genre" types for mass consumption, yet the better works among them—those

examined in this course, now called "hard-boiled novels" and "noir films,"—have had an extraordinary and ongoing impact on popular and high culture, greatly affecting taste and entertainment preferences. The class will read and discuss the three preeminent fiction works of the 30s—two featuring "tough" detectives Sam Spade and Philip Marlowe, made famous by Humphrey Bogart—and view in class the acclaimed films they inspired. The first class film is *Detour*, which will serve as a crisp introduction to the world of "noir" on both thematic and stylistic levels. **Suggested Reading**: Dashiell Hammett, *The Maltese Falcon*, 1930; Raymond Chandler, *The Big Sleep*, 1939, and essay, *The Simple Art of Murder*, 1950; James M. Cain, *The Postman Always Rings Twice*, 1934. In-class screenings of films based on the novels, directed by: (MF) John Huston, 1941 w/Humphrey Bogart, Peter Lorre; (BS) Howard Hawks, 1946 w/Bogart & Lauren Bacall; (PART) Tay Garnett, 1946 w/John Garfield and Lana Turner And: DETOUR, 1945, directed by Edgar G. Ulmer. (This 68 min. film will be screened in first class.) *Maximum class size: 30*.

## Nabokov's Lolita: The Writer as Literary Gamesman

Vladimir Nabokov brings to his celebrated, darkly comic 1958 novel *Lolita* an exuberant delight in language and allusion. Poe, Melville, Joyce, and Freud haunt the novel. We will also find doubles and games-within-games everywhere. Additionally, we'll view scenes from Stanley Kubrick's 1962 film adaptation, starring James Mason, Shelley Winters, Sue Lyon, and Peter Sellers. Then

we'll fast-forward to the emotionally darker 1997 French-American production featuring Jeremy Irons, Dominique Swain, Melanie Griffith, and Frank Langella. Get ready, everyone. . . . **Suggested Reading**: Instructor will be using Alfred Appel's edition *The Annotated Lolita*, a goldmine of information. New York: McGraw-Hill, 1970. ## The Short Novels of Carson McCullers and Truman Capote - Humor and Horror in the South

**Tuition \$55** 

The lyrical writing of Carson McCullers and Truman Capote captures characters of the South who are dreamers or just plain eccentrics. These writers' characters can display great bursts of hilarious insight or dark explorations of loneliness . . . or both! We'll explore these eccentricities in these works: Capote's funny Breakfast at Tiffany's and his more melancholy *The Grass Harp*; McCullers' hilarious *The Member of the Wedding* and her darker *Reflections in a Golden Eye*. We will explore and discuss the texts, watch brief film clips from plays and movies based on the books, and investigate issues captured in the literature of the period, including the Southern Gothic, sexuality, regionalism, and segregation. We will work to connect these themes and invigorate our own ways of understanding modern literature and its relevancy to the contemporary world. **Suggested Reading:** Truman Capote, *Breakfast at Tiffany's*; Truman Capote, *The Grass Harp*; Carson McCullers, *The Member of the Wedding*; Carson McCullers, *Reflections in a Golden Eye. Maximum class size: 30.* 

## Hablo Español - Conversational Spanish

It's great to say "yes" when asked "do you speak another language?" (especially in Florida). A basic knowledge of Spanish is preferable to get the most benefit from this class because although conversation is the main emphasis, we will be writing using past and future tenses. Students will be immersed in interesting activities and group interactive lessons as a way to improve their skills. # Cosmic Evolution: Nine Turning Points

There are nine turning points in the evolution of the cosmos that most contributed to the world we see today and can expect in the future. We will look at each point and the primary science that best describes it. The turning points are: Creation, Matter, Stars and Galaxies, Solar System, Earth, Life, Hominids, Human Culture, and Dissolution. The sciences range from physics, chemistry, astronomy, and geology to biology, anthropology, and sociology. The intention of the class is to teach the interested layman various scientific concepts, introduce them to critical scientific thinking, and show how three main concepts link the world together: complexity, emergence, and evolution. *Maximum class size:* 80.

Genetics: The Wave of the Present (and the Future) and Its Impact on You and Your Family's Medical Care

**Tuition \$30** 



This course will entail a description of the fast-moving field of clinical genetics in the last 15 years. It is now at the forefront of medical care and available in every primary care office. We will discuss in detail personalized genomic medicine as it relates to medication choices/treatments for different conditions, cancer risk and management, cardiovascular genetics, genetics of dementia, nutritional supplements of value in certain conditions, and the ethical decisions that may be impacted in genetic testing. One of our classes will involve a facility tour of the FSU College of Medicine, its Clinical Learning Center, and its biomedical labs. Part of one session will focus on the ethics of genetic testing and research with volunteer panels created from participants to discuss several cases (pros/cons). *Maximum class size: 110*.

## The Parallel Universe of Ants

Ants, like humans, are entirely social creatures, but the basis of their sociality and the run of their lives are so different from that of humans that theirs appears as an exotic, alien world. Through lectures, demonstrations and discussions, we will explore the intricacies of how ant colonies are organized, how they function, how they reproduce and how they develop. Emphasis will be on the astounding range of natural histories and life cycles of selected species, especially species from our region. Many surprising and/or charming features of ant biology will be revealed, as will a host of unanswered but interesting questions. Field trips are possible if they can be

scheduled. **Suggested Reading:** Hoelldobler and Wilson, The Ants, Harvard/Belknap, 1990; Tschinkel, The Fire Ants, Harvard/Belknap, 2006. *Maximum class size: 110*.

## Sea Around You: Local Coastal Ecology & Conservation Topics

Barbara Shoplock and William Herrnkind, Ph.D., Dept. of Biology, FSU

11:30 a.m. - 1:30 p.m., Mondays, (9/30, 10/7 and 10/14) and field trip date: Saturday 10/12/13 with a rain date trip of Saturday 10/19/13

(Broad Auditorium, Pepper Center, FSU Campus)

Through lecture, hands-on lab experiences & a field/boat trip, our aim is to educate and inspire coastal citizens. The course includes a

brief overview of the general ecology of this part of the Gulf of Mexico, an introduction to animal diversity and some discussion of several important marine conservation issues. After a short, guided walking tour at the FSU Coastal & Marine Lab (St. Teresa Beach), we will meet some of the local marine denizens in our seawater touch-tanks. From there, we don wading shoes (closed toed shoes with back straps) and head to the stable pontoon boats to put our learning to work exploring the citizens of our local seagrass beds. While we will do our best to accommodate all levels of mobility, participants attending will need to be able to climb down ladder stairs to the boat, or step from a dock over to the boat. Participants must provide their own transportation to



the marine lab (50 miles from Tallahassee). There will be a small charge for the boat trip (actual amount will depend on the number of people in the class, but it will be less than \$10). The only prerequisite for this course is interest in our water planet and its curious inhabitants! *Maximum class size:* 20.

# **Women in Science**

Since Larry Summers rose to national celebrity in 2005 over comments he made regarding why women were not leaders in science ("issues of intrinsic aptitude"), the discussion of the gender disparities in the STEM fields has not subsided. This course will provide some insight into the experience of women in science, as scientists addressing important biological and physical science challenges, as educators invested in training women in the STEM fields, and as leaders and administrators in science and medicine. The six participants in the three week series are all distinguished scientists (who happen to be women) and are looking forward to telling you about themselves and the research that they are passionate about. *Maximum class size:* 80.

This course is a hands-on workshop designed to help you begin and develop the elements that will make up a mystery story or novel. It is for anyone who enjoys mystery reading and might like to write one some day. The class will consist of the instructor presenting a topic, demonstrating samples, leading the class members into writing for five minutes, and members volunteering to read their sentences and receive oral comment. Each of the following topics will be covered over the course of the five sessions: 1. The Game Is A foot! Finding the idea and general plot, using a setting, writing the grabber beginning; 2. The Twisted Lip! Locating the right characters for the plot, developing them through action and purpose; 3. Silent and Furtive Movements! Suspense throughout and keeping it real; 4. The Dog In the Night! Editing, over writing, finding voice, making it better; 5. Come, Watson! Starting your own story or novel and going forth with it; and 6. The Elements, Sherlock! # Frequently Asked Questions about OLLI at FSU

What is the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at Florida State University? OLLI at FSU is a scholarly and exciting program of classes, programs, activities and opportunities targeted to retired individuals and folks over 50 across Leon County and beyond who want to continue their education in a stress-free environment where there are no tests and no homework. OLLI at FSU is associated with the Pepper Institute on Aging and Public Policy. OLLI is funded through membership dues, class fees, support from the Bernard Osher Foundation and other agencies, as well as private giving.

## How is OLLI managed?

Management consists of a director (Debra Herman), program coordinator (Terry Aaronson), and financial associate (Tiffany Lemon). The director is responsible for planning, administering, and evaluating all activities related to the program and its operations within Florida State University's guidelines as well as responsibility for the program design, goals and procedures. The program coordinator is responsible for managing the daily operations of the program, including online registration, print and social media, as well as assisting in the development and implementation of program objectives. The financial associate is responsible for following the university's financial policies and procedures for the program. This includes ordering supplies, providing accounting data, reconciling accounts, ensuring payment for services, and working with instructors of OLLI at FSU. The concept of shared leadership between the professional staff and the members is a long-standing tradition. This shared leadership takes many forms, such as collaboration between staff and members on all committees, curriculum development and members providing administrative support.

What role do members play in the management of OLLI? OLLI at FSU is a member-driven organization that has a Member Board. The board gives voice to the membership. Members, through committees, volunteer to establish and direct a wide range of activities beyond classes, including special-interest clubs, field trips, cultural activities, social events and other activities and programs. All members are invited to participate in these activities.

# How do the staff and the board interact, and who is responsible for the long-term planning of the organization?

Staff and board work together to provide the best quality programs and activities possible.

## How are classes selected?

The Curriculum Committee, which consists of the director, program coordinator, board president and first vice president, Westminster Oaks Member-at-large and the Curriculum Subject Committee Chair meet each term to review proposals received from university and college faculty and community experts to determine the courses that match membership interests as determined through periodic surveys.





For the Fall 2013 class term, OLLI members who take classes at the Claude Pepper Center will be offered parking by purchasing a membership permit at the FSU Call Street Garage, which is located on the corner of Macomb and Call Street. The top floor of the garage is reserved on class days for OLLI members. From the floor of the garage take the stairs

or the elevator to the Call Street level, walk past the Fine Arts Building, cross Copeland Street, and you'll find the Claude Pepper Center in that block. Total travel is two blocks.
