A Sound World: A Musical Journey Around the Globe (NEW)

Matt DelCiampo, Ph.D. candidate in Musicology at Florida State University 2:00 p.m. - 4:00 p.m., Mondays

In this course we will survey the music and culture of people throughout the world. We will spend our class time listening to music, analyzing how it operates, and discussing its historical context. No prior musical experience is necessary, but if you've ever wanted to learn more about the music of places like Ireland, South Africa, Egypt, India, Brazil, the Caribbean, China, Bali, and others, this course is for you! *Maximum class size: 110*.

Magic Cities (NEW)

Seven cities will be interpreted in order to shed light upon two of humans' most splendid inventions: architecture and the city, its millennia-old stage. The history and development of the historic urban landscapes of Pompeii, Hong Kong, Chicago, La Habana, Istanbul, Kyoto and Barcelona will be explored in order to understand how these cores and their unique personalities have been able to provide spiritual and physical shelter to millions throughout the centuries. General aspects about their individual cultures – from cuisine to legends – will also be presented. *Suggested reading* found in the online course description. *Maximum class size: 110*



Painting in Our Time: From Realism to Fantasy (NEW)

Invented in prehistoric times, the fine art of painting dramatically transformed during the 19th century as a result of several cultural dislocations. The course will cover the revolution experienced by this art form in the West from the mid-19th century to the first decades of the 20th century. The material will

be divided in the following manner: (i) Introduction; (ii) Realism and Impressionism; (iii) Post-Impressionism and Neo-Impressionism; (iv) Pointillism and Fauvism; (v) Cubism and Surrealism; (vi) Abstractionism and Dada; and (vii) Pop and Op Art. *Suggested reading* found in the online course description. *Maximum class size:* 50

A Whirlwind Tour of the History of Women in Aviation (5-Week Class) (NEW)

We will embark upon an "aerial tour" of the history of women taking flight, from balloons to solo flights, fighter pilots, and space travel. Our journey will span three centuries. We will visit a variety of nations and cultures, and we will hear inside views and untold stories from commercial, military and disaster relief aviation. We will devote special attention to the forgotten story of the two pilots who raced to become the first woman to complete the around-the-world flight that eluded Amelia Earhart, and we will hear from the pilot who completed that journey and lived to tell about it, in her own voice. Along the way we will discuss the value of these heroine's journeys, and consider what risks are worth taking, and why. Suggested reading found in the online course description. Fear, Greed & Stupidity: Thomas Jefferson's Foreign Policies (NEW)

Moving north from the Gulf Coast--the Forgotten Coast--into Spanish Borderlands, we will examine international politics as they evolved from the First Continental Congress in 1774. Security was a premium and fear cast a long shadow over the entirety of world affairs. Would big shifts in the balance of power bring more dangers, either because rising powers challenged the status quo, or lagging powers might launch preventive wars? What were the dumb things the first U.S. Secretary of State, Thomas Jefferson did? And how did we end up with a Congressional Ethnic Cleansing Act in 1830 that circumvented treaties with foreign nations? The course aims to examine changing norms and identities, themselves products of human interaction. Although we can't predict how attitudes, norms, identities and beliefs will evolve, being aware of this aspect of early U.S. history will keep you from being completely blindsided when seemingly unchallenged orthodoxies are suddenly swept away. Maximum class size: 50.



Mission San Luis site as a focal point, lectures will focus on Apalachee culture, Spanish colonial Florida, the struggle for Empire in the Southeastern U.S., antebellum Florida, Florida and the Civil War, and industry in post-Civil War Florida. Lectures will be complemented by "living history" encounters at Mission San Luis, which will allow course participants to experience Spanish colonial Florida on a firsthand basis. Social Justice History: Stories of Toil, Sacrifices & Radical Transitions (3-Week Class) (NEW)

Stories of Toil, Sacrifice and Radical Transitions of persons of African descent will be shared. Presentations will use genealogy, dramatic presentations, history of the displaced Smokey Hollow Community- now Cascades Park, and folk music to invoke the audience to increase understanding of human toil and varied viewpoints enveloped in histories of oppression. Material and subject matter often referred to by museums as "the hard stuff", will be shared. This sharing takes place appropriately during this season of emancipation during which major legal decisions brought freedom to disenfranchised populations of color: Passage of the 1964 Civil Rights Act, 1965 Voting Rights Act and the era embodying the signing and implementing of the Emancipation Proclamation. *Maximum class size: 35.*

The Coming Storm, U.S. 1845-1861 tracks the growing national division from the Mexican-American War to the secession of the last four states, following the firing on Ft. Sumter. Two major steps along the road to war are the compromise of 1850 and the Kansas-Nebraska Act in 1854. By the mid-fifties, a political revolution had destroyed one party, created a new party and seriously divided a third party. Vitally important in the last five years of this course are "Bleeding Kansas," the Brooks-Sumner Affair and the Lincoln-Douglas debates. The final steps to conflict are John Brown's raid on Harpers Ferry, the presidential election of 1860, followed shortly be secession. When three major compromise efforts fail, the course ends in Charleston Harbor on an April night in 1861. Suggested reading found in the online course description. Maximum class size: 110.



The History of Greed (NEW)

Greed is one of the seven deadly sins and has been universally condemned by prophets, philosophers, and your mother. It is, however, a fact of life. This course examines the problems with greed, its definition

and historical reality. We will especially look at greed in America, starting with the greed cycle of the 19th, 20th, and 21st centuries and, especially, the Great Depression and the extraordinary greed of the last thirty years. We will conclude the course with the historical counters to greed. Maximum class size: 110.

Socrates in Love: Love and Passion expressed in the Humanities (NEW)

Inspired by Christopher Phillips' book Socrates in Love: Philosophy for a Passionate Heart, we will discuss the various expressions of love in philosophy, literature, art and music. Starting with the work of Plato, we'll explore the concepts of Eros, Philia and Agape, move on to Ovid's Art of Love, share divine love from Corinthians in the Holy Bible, read the poetry of Shakespeare and other writers, listen to Beethoven's Sonatas, discuss Oscar Wilde's "love that dares not speak its name," and finally analyze Freud's concept of eroticism and sexuality. Visually, we'll fall in love with the art of various artists, such as the sculptor Rodin, as well as the visual artists Rubens, Klimt, and Van Gogh. Some literary selections, Tolstoy's Anna Karenina and Goethe's Suffering of Young Werther, will shed light on the destructive side of passion. *Suggested reading* found in the online course description. *Maximum class size: 35*.


The Multiple Legacies of Joel Chandler Harris (NEW)

Bruce Bickely, Ph.D., Professor Emeritus, English Dept., FSU

Joel Chandler Harris's rich legacy includes pioneering 1880's volumes of African American folktales, especially Uncle Remus: His Songs and His Sayings and Nights with Uncle Remus; moving portraits of male and female black slaves, freedmen, and poor whites; and revitalized children's storytelling techniques that directly influenced Kipling, Beatrix Potter, A. A. Milne, and E. B. White. As editors for the Atlanta Constitution, Harris and Henry Grady helped create The New South out of the ashes of The Old South. Finally, Harris's iconographic characters and motifs still resonate today, in thousands of popular culture reincarnations of Uncle Remus, Brer Rabbit, Brer Fox, the Tar Baby, and the Briar Patch. These themes also appear, distorted, in the Disneyfication of Harris in Song of the South (1946). We will screen segments from the film and discuss the controversies that continue to swirl around Harris. Metaphorically, we are still glommed onto the Tar Baby. *Suggested reading* found in the online course description. *Maximum class size: 30.*

Religions of the Ancient and Modern World (7-Week Course) (NEW)

This course is on comparative religions of the world. It includes primitive religions, ancient historical religions, and how they have developed into the religions that we see in the world today. It is taught using a scholarly approach as generally accepted by the academic studies of the history, philosophy,

and sociology of religion. There will also be investigation into recent scientific theories that attempt to address some of the same themes as historically addressed by theology. *Maximum class size:* 50.

About Time (NEW)

In this course we will discuss various ideas/thoughts relating to time: origin of ideas of time, perception of time; concept of time through history, various philosophers' take on time; time in physics and other sciences; absolute time, relative time; geological time; space-time, cosmological time; how modern physics influenced our concept of time; time measurement; time units, calendars; timescales, age of the earth, the universe; and the arrow of time and time reversal. This class will be discussion-based and geared toward the interest of the audience. *Suggested reading* found in the online course description. *Maximum class size: 30*.

Aerospace, Rocketry & Space Exploration (3-Week Class) (NEW)

This course addresses everything aerospace from airplanes to rockets and space exploration. Through this three-week course you will be engaged in hands-on, minds-on learning while building different paper airplanes and rockets that test their lift, thrust and drag; building different rockets to see how Newton's Laws of motion are demonstrated through rocket launches; and become a NASA engineer and astronaut in the Challenger Learning Center's Mission Control and Space Station simulation. *Maximum class size: 30.*

New Concepts in Medical Care (NEW)

This class will address new concepts and discoveries in how medical care is practiced in America. Topics will include a discussion of new models of care (accountable care organizations and patient-centered medical homes), medical errors and how to reduce them, the Choosing Wisely campaign, and new ideas on the proper role of medications in such conditions as high cholesterol, high blood pressure, and depression. Attention will also be directed to non-medicinal methods for treatment and prevention such as new data on the role of physical activity, diet, and stress management. *Maximum class size:* 80

Robots (3-Week Class) (NEW)

Through this three-week course you will be engaged in hands-on, minds-on learning. You will begin by exploring simple machines and the mechanics that allow robots to work including levers, axles, wheels and pulleys. Instructors will then lead you to building and programming LEGO WeDo and NXT robots to perform specific tasks and react to sound and movement. The course will end with you utilizing your imagination to build and program robots to complete multiple tasks. *Maximum class size: 30*

The Birth, Life, and Death of Stars (NEW)

Jorge Piekarewicz, Ph.D., Professor, Dept. of Physics, FSU

The inner workings of the Universe captures our imagination perhaps more than anything else. The birth, life, and death of stars provides an ideal framework for demonstrating the power and elegance of science. Moreover, the "Physics of Stars" provides a unique opportunity to learn how many areas of physics - from quantum mechanics to general relativity - coalesce and become instrumental in understanding these fascinating objects.

Among the many questions that we will attempt to answer in this course are the following: (a) Where did the raw material that makes up stars come from? (b) How do stars shine? (c) Where and how are the chemical elements essential for life made? (d) How do stars die? *Suggested reading* will be given by instructor. *Maximum class size:* 110

Thwarting the Triple-Headed Monster That Threatens North Florida's Ecology (NEW)





Guest Policy



Participation in OLLI at FSU classes, clubs and activities is a member benefit. A member may invite a guest to lunches and dinners for a non-member fee. Frequently Asked Questions about OLLI at FSU

What is the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at Florida State University? OLLI at FSU is a scholarly and exciting program of classes, programs, activities and opportunities targeted to retired individuals and folks over 50 across Leon County and beyond who want to continue their education in a stress-free environment where there are no tests and no homework. OLLI at FSU is associated with the Pepper Institute on Aging and Public Policy. OLLI is funded through membership dues, class fees, support from the Bernard Osher Foundation and other agencies, as well as private donations.

How is OLLI managed? Management consists of a director (Debra Herman), program coordinator (Terry Aaronson), and financial associate (Tiffany Lemon). The director is responsible for planning, administering, and evaluating all activities related to the program and its operations within Florida State University's guidelines as well as responsibility for the program design, goals and procedures. The program coordinator is responsible for managing the daily operations of the program, including online registration, print and social media, as well as assisting in the development and implementation of program objectives. The financial associate is responsible for following the university's financial policies and procedures for the program. This includes ordering supplies, providing accounting data, reconciling accounts, ensuring payment for services, and working with instructors of OLLI at FSU. The concept of shared leadership between the professional staff and the members is a long-standing tradition. This shared leadership takes many forms, such as collaboration between staff and members on all committees, curriculum development and members providing administrative support.

What role do members play in the management of OLLI? OLLI at FSU is a member-centered organization that has a Member Board. The board gives voice to the membership. Members, through committees, volunteer to establish and direct a wide range of activities beyond classes, including special-interest clubs, field trips, cultural activities, social events and other activities and programs. All members are invited to participate in these activities.

How do the staff and the board interact, and who is responsible for the long-term planning of the organization? Staff and board work together to provide the best quality programs and activities possible.

How are classes selected? The Curriculum Committee, which consists of the director, program coordinator, board president, first and second-vice president, Westminster Oaks Member-at-large and the Curriculum Subject Committee Chair meet each term to review proposals received from university and college faculty and community experts to determine the courses that match membership interests as determined through periodic surveys.



Directions from the garage to the Pepper Center and Sandels Bldg.: from the Call Street level, walk past the Fine Arts Building, cross Copeland Street, and you'll find the Claude Pepper Center in that block on the right, the Sandels Bldg, is on the left. Total travel is two blocks. After purchase, you will receive an Email Confirmation that will serve as your pass. Please print it out and place on driver's side dashboard. Garage attendants will direct you where to park.
