Withdrawal/Refund Policy: To withdraw from a class, please notify the OLLI director at dherman@fsu.edu. If you withdraw from a class and want a refund, please make your request by the end of the first week of class. Class fees will not be refunded after the first week. To receive a refund for a one-day class, you must withdraw and request a refund at least one week prior to the class date. A \$10 withdrawal fee will be assessed for each class that you withdraw from, up to a maximum \$25 withdrawal fee per term. No-shows forfeit their course fee. **Membership and activity fees are non-refundable.** If you are joining OLLI for one class only, ensure there are seats available by clicking on "Check Availability" **before** you pay for membership. Please do not purchase membership if your preferred class is unavailable for purchase or has a waitlist.

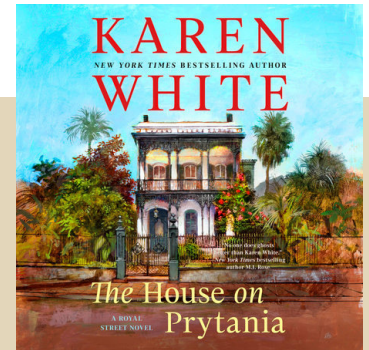

Have you spent fall Saturdays and Sundays totally confused about the hype surrounding the game with the funny-shaped ball? Have you given up trying to learn because the game moved too quickly, or no one had the time or patience to teach you? Football 101 is for the person who knows very little or nothing about American football. You will learn about the field and markings, equipment, scoring, kicking, player positions, officials, rules and penalties, coaches, simple strategy and football jargon. After you complete this class, you will be cheering right along with everyone else. **NOT** to be missed -- on May 8 we will take a guided tour of Doak Campbell Stadium led by Carol Moore, executive assistant to Coach Mike Norvell, visit the field, the trophy room and much more! In addition, we will have two special guest speakers: 1) Heisman Trophy Winner Charlie Ward, former FSU quarterback, football and basketball coach, and NBA veteran and 2) Bob Gosselin, seasoned high school football official. He started in 2007 in Orlando with the Central Florida Officials Association. Now in his 12th year with the Big Bend Football Officials Association, Bob just stepped down after serving six years as the association president. Class size limit: 30.

Mindfulness and Compassion-Based Resilience Training (In-person)

In this three-week experiential training, you will be introduced to scientifically proven mindfulness and compassion-based stress reduction and resilience techniques and learn how to generate lasting inner joy. Each session will have a main topic where we will explore the concepts of genuine happiness, mindfulness, compassion, caring for bliss, forgiveness and generosity, and then learn various techniques, such as mindful movement, loving kindness meditation, gratitude exercises, and how to integrate them into our daily lives. There will be room for group sharing and discussions.

SKILL REQUIREMENT: Participants should be able to lie down on a yoga mat for some gentle movements on the floor. Class size limit: 35.

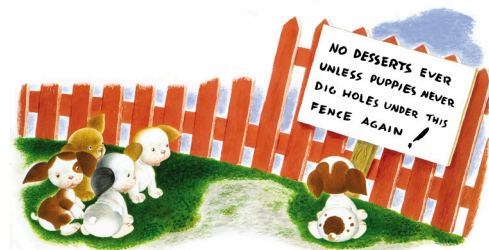
Recent experience with the COVID-19 pandemic has presented medical challenges. This public health emergency also generated significant ethical, legal, political and policy controversies concerning issues such as: quarantine and isolation orders; mandatory vaccination; masking mandates; closures of or restrictions regarding schools, businesses, houses of worship, and other public gathering places; and the equitable allocation of scarce resources. This course will examine these controversies in anticipation of the next inevitable infectious disease pandemic. Class size limit: 50.

The Reign of Charles II and the Birth of Modern Britain, 1660 - 1685 (Zoom)

6 sessions with Eoin Devlin, Director of Studies in History, Hughes Hall, University of Cambridge

Tuesdays 5/2, 5/9, 5/16, 5/23, 5/30, 6/6 | 12:00 - 2:00 p.m. ET | \$65

The reign of Charles II marked the return of monarchy to Britain after the collapse of the republican government that had been in power since the execution of Charles I in 1649. This period of British history is known as the Restoration, but while the power of the Crown might have been restored, these years witnessed considerable innovation and change. This course will explore how Charles' reign might reasonably be considered to represent the birth of modern Britain in key respects. The power of the Crown now found itself challenged by Parliament once again, and by the 1680s political parties had formed for the first time. The 'coffee-house' culture changed the nature of public discourse and opened up new ways for ordinary people to engage with politics. Britain went to war against its main commercial rival, the Dutch Republic, and the creation of the Royal African Company consolidated slavery as central to Britain's imperial economy. Scientific and cultural innovations demonstrated that this was an age in which many of the preconceptions of the earlier century were being abandoned, even as religious conflict and the legacies of the Reformation continued to be important. Class size limit: 90.



Golden Legacy: The Story of Golden Books (In-person)

The 1924 launch of Golden Books revolutionized the children's book industry by making high-quality picture books available at affordable prices. The first session will focus on the development of the company into a publishing juggernaut. Session 2 will examine the lives and work of the illustrators during the 1930s through the mid 1950s. The class will conclude with a guided tour of the Gadsden Arts Center & Museum, including the current exhibit, The Golden Legacy, which showcases original artwork from many of the Golden Books. **Photo Caption:** Gustaf Tenggren, The Poky Little Puppy, 1942, digital reproduction, 17.5 x 26 inches, © 1942 by Penguin Random House. What Does a Conductor Really DO? (In-person)

In this class, we'll look at behind-the-scenes things that conductors do (compiling programs, establishing a musical interpretation, etc.). Participants can follow these presentations by compiling their own programs, thinking about the best way to perform a given piece, etc. We'll also go over common gestures that conductors use to get a particular response – without having to tell their musicians what to DO. And, yes, participants will have the opportunity to try their hand at actually conducting, if they want to. What FUN(!). Class size limit: 30.

Mountain Dulcimer in American Culture

Using recordings, photos and live music, the course traces the mountain dulcimer from its Appalachian origins to the present. From mountain family gatherings and church services through the Greenwich folk revival to the current crossover into other musical genres, such as jazz, blues and rock 'n roll, the course explores the role this simple instrument has played in American culture.

NATO Update (Zoom)

3 sessions with Mark Schlakman, Senior Program Director, FSU Center for the Advancement of Human Rights

Regardless of whether you might have opted to take FSU/ OLLI's initial North American Treaty Organization-related course last year, this three-week NATO Update will explore current geopolitical and humanitarian issues surrounding Russia's intervention into Ukraine, as well as issues pertaining to the alliance itself, including engagement by the United States and also membership. Class size limit: 90.

Exploring Medieval and Renaissance Maps – Still More New Topics (Zoom)

In this course we will delve into several exciting aspects of early modern maps, including the cartographic history of a mythical island in the Atlantic, the evolution of European ideas about the Pacific and Indian Oceans, Ottoman adaptations of European cartouches, and some of the ways cartographers have depicted the unknown. You will not be disappointed. This course is a sequel to the three map courses offered previously. Those earlier courses are NOT prerequisites for this one—all of the necessary context will be explained in this course. Class size limit: 90.

Beginning Italian Conversation (Zoom)

This interactive class serves as an introduction to the Italian language and will focus on conversation skills, although some reading and writing will be covered. No prior experience is necessary, although graduates of our Italian for Travelers course may want to take this to expand on their knowledge.

Tallahassee became the site for Florida's capital 200 years ago, in 1823. How did commissioners from Pensacola and St. Augustine describe their expedition to the "old fields near Tallahassee"? What role did Free Black translator Antonio Proctor play in connecting the commissioners with Native American Chief Neamathla? What kind of welcome party did Natives, Blacks and Crackers throw when Williams and Simmons arrived? Through hands-on experience with primary documents, dramatized first-person perspectives and expert guest speakers, this class builds bridges for finding Tallahassee. Class size limit: 90.

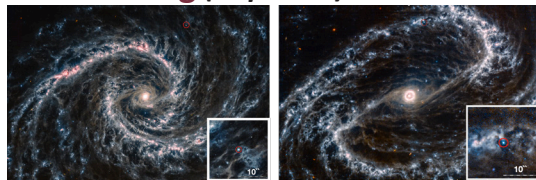

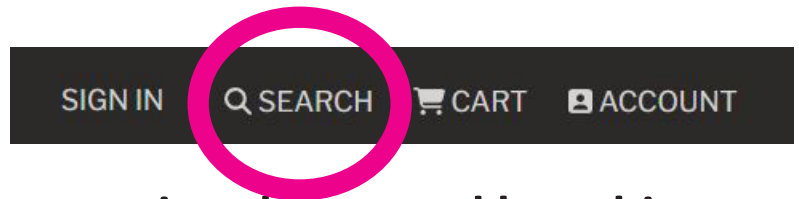
